

Texel Origin and History

The Texel Sheep originates from the Island of Texel, one of the North-Western Islands off Holland where it has been known since Roman times. Throughout the centuries, selection, as well as an infusion of British blood, principally from the Lincoln as well as a little from the Border Leicester, Leicester, South Down, Hampshire Down and Wensleydale, has improved its potential.

About 1933, the Texel was introduced to France and has since become established, particularly in the Northern provinces. In 1970, the first Texels were introduced to the United Kingdom with an importation organised by the Animal Breeding Research Organisation, who brought in four rams for experimental purposes. Another four followed in 1971 and ABRO initiated extensive trials to compare the Texel with other terminal sires. The verdict was that the Texel excelled in carcase quality and in particular, in lean meat yield.

In 1973, thirteen Lanarkshire sheep breeders joined forces with ABRO to import twenty-seven Texel females and thirteen rams from France. Further importations were made throughout the 1970s, with the first direct import from Holland at the end of that decade.

DESCRIPTION OF TYPE

Head: The length of head from crown to nose should be one and a half times the width when viewed sideways. The crown should be flat and unwooled, the nose dark, preferably black. The head must be covered with fine white hair; when spots occur on ears or eyelids, these should be of a bright black colour.

Body: The body and the neck should be thick-set, without impairing the general appearance. Furthermore, it must be well proportioned with strong loins, a solid square stance and round well developed gigots. The udder is covered with fine hair and is usually lined with wool, the scrotum is covered with fine hair or short wool. The wool of the trunk extends to the end of the throat.


Legs: The legs are strong with shanks of sufficient size to correspond with the thick-set build of the body. The front legs are wooled at least down to the middle of the forearm, the hind legs at least down to the middle of the shank. In so far as the legs are not wooled, they are covered with fine hair.

ADAPTABILITY

The Texel has primarily been developed as a meat breed but its native environment has endowed it with invaluable commercial traits. The Texel ewe is hardy and exceptionally thrifty and her lambs have a tremendous get-up-and-go attitude, searching hard for milk as soon as they are born. Again, the breed's harsh native environment has led to the development of a sheep that thrives on poor pastures and requires only modest amounts of feed in the run-up to lambing and whilst suckling.

In Great Britain, the Texels have shown that they are capable of withstanding the rigours of the Scottish winter without any hardship and their progeny have proved to be as adaptable in our climate and altitude as the flocks in Holland and France.

The Breed is well known in Europe and in the continents of Africa and South America as a provider of a high quality carcase which has a high killing out percentage. It is also well known in many countries as a breed which transmits its qualities to its progeny when used for crossing purposes.

N ational Flock of the Year

Winner is from England

One of the most consistently successful competitors in regional flock competitions went one step further to win the 2000 national Flock of the Year competition. In the final, the English champions, Jean and Mick Gould's Woodmarsh flock, based at Bomere Heath, Shrewsbury, beat the three other finalists, the champion flocks of Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland.

Judge Chris Lewis praised the overall quality of the flocks, run under a variety of conditions "from cold, open farms and in very wet boggy fields to hard, high hills with sparse feed." He said: "The breed's original importers would have been pleased to see the

hardiness and good legs and feet along with the obvious carcase qualities.

"All the flocks were very well presented, sometimes in atrocious weather conditions."

Mr Lewis' "close second", was Douganhill Farms' 65-ewe Douganhill flock at Orchardton Mains, Castle Douglas.

The Northern Ireland finalist was Victor Chesnutt's Clougher flock at Bushmills, Co. Antrim and leading the way for Wales, Geraint Jones' Erw flock at Nanterwhaidd, Corwen, Denbighshire.

The judge described the 80 Woodmarsh flock ewes as being "extremely well matched with good length and tight skins. The staple was of reasonable length - an important factor if we are not to lose this

in pursuit of tight skins".

"The ewes showed great character with plenty of depth and size and were good on their legs. They had classic Texel heads without being too powerful. I was impressed by the Goulds' choice of rams which were clearly adding depth of gigot without losing length and topline.

"Their breeding policy reflected good commercial awareness. Rams from this flock would clearly produce the type of lambs demanded by the meat trade."

Outstanding stock sires used by the Goulds have included Annan Burnished Gold. A son of Woodmarsh All Gold and a full brother to Annan

Born Free. He was purchased privately in 1995, has left tremendous size and his daughters have bred extremely well.

The following year Kirtle Craftsman, the first prize ram lamb at the Royal, was purchased at Lanark for 6,500gs. "A more compact type," said Mr Gould, "bought for his solid muscle, great skin and his very correct legs and feet." Fifty per cent of the breeding females are by Craftsman.

In 1999, a joint purchase at 11,000gs bought Baltier Freddie to the flock. He was the first prize MLC ram lamb at Lanark, " a great scopy lamb on good legs and feet with tremendous gigot characteristics that he is passing onto his progeny."


Freddie was shown twice last year, standing second in the shearling ram class at the Royal Show and taking the breed championship at the Royal Lancs. His first crop included the first prize recorded ram lamb at the Welsh Premier and a second prize ram lamb at Chelford.

The Goulds have won the Shropshire G Borders flock competition for the past four years. Main enterprise on their 400-acre farm is a highly successful 200-cow dairy herd and they have applied their cattle breeding know-how to the flock they founded in 1988.

Says Mick Gould: "We must attract the commercial man. In the past, commercial producers criticised Texel cross lambs as not having the growth rate or weight of Suffolk crosses so we are conscious of size while recognising that we must not lose the breed's special conformation qualities.

"What surprises me is that people pick out a tup lamb but don't ask to see the mother or sister. Its said that an average-looking bull out of a good family is a better bet than a good-looking bull out of an average family.

"I think its the same with sheep. Every year when we go through the lamb crop it's the same families that throw up the good lambs."

Champion Flock of Wales

The Champion Flock of Wales Trophy, contested between three winners of the Welsh Clubs' Flock Competitions and ably judged by Nigel Gibbs, was awarded to Mr Geraint Jones, Nant Erw Haidd, Gwyddelwern, Corwen, representing the Ruthin Club. In the subsequent National Flock Competition, the Erw flock was placed a proud fourth.

Geraint's Erw flock is one of the best known flocks in Wales and can boast a string of past achievements in flock competitions and on the showground, at local and national level, which winning the Ruthin includes Champion Flock Competition on ten occasions out of twelve, winning the Champion Flock of Wales three years out of five, and the Male and Female Champion at the Royal Welsh Show. The Erw flock has produced the Ruthin Sale Champion on three occasions, the Welsh Premier Male Champion on two occasions and also the Chelford Champion with rams being sold all over the country.

The Erw flock was established in 1979 by Geraint and his late wife Linda, with the purchase of three females from leading Scottish flocks and one Dutch import. The following years Grougfoot Legacy and Midhill Kiev joined the flock. Further quality rams from Muirfoot. Cambwell. Tinwald, Oakhead, Braque Stainton have all helped to produce the strong, well grown female flock at Erw. The flock has been a closed one with few outside purchases. By now, the Erw flock consists of a hundred pedigree ewes, plus followers. The

rams in use at present are Muiresk Firecracker, Kirtle Decoy, Green Dipper and Kiltariff Freelander. They run alongside a commercial flock of 1,200 ewes put to Texel Border Leicester and Welsh rams on this upland grassland farm, also carrying suckler and store cattle at a height of 700 to 1,100 feet above sea level. All produce is marketed through Ruthin Farmers Auction Mart and Texel Club and Society Sales.

Geraint is one of the most enthusiastic Texel breeders in North Wales, and through his many achievements is a worthy ambassador for the breed and deserving winner of the accolade Welsh Flockmaster of the Year. Congratulations!



Report on Tamnamoney Flock

Roger Strawbridge says his late father, Ivan, taught him about sheep and fellow pedigree breeder, Victor Chestnutt, provided tutoring in Texels!

The Tamnamoney Texel flock of Roger and his wife, Barbara, is the main enterprise on their family farm near Coleraine, County Londonderry. However, Tamnamoney tups now sell far from Ulster's scenic north coast to leading flocks nationwide.

"Growing up on a sheep farm where my father had the motto: 'big is beautiful', I learned a wee lamb makes a wee gimmer and a wee gimmer makes a wee ewe!" Roger recalled. "A conviction which greatly influences the type of Texel we select to produce pedigree sheep with power and commercial lambs with the size and shape to give good grades and fast finishing to pleasing prices. Sheep need size and substance for success!"

After Agricultural College, Roger, apart from working on the home farm part-time, spent four years helping Victor Chestnutt of Clougher Texels fame.

"When, ten years ago, I turned 21, a burning ambition to establish a pedigree Texel flock became a reality. Mum and Dad gave me a birthday present of a pedigree Texel ewe, as did my three sisters and Victor, who offered a free choice from his flock! Those three ewes, plus a fourth bought with my savings, were the foundation of the Tamnamoney Pedigree Texel flock."

"Victor then let my four ewes run with his leading tup which sired a first crop of six lambs, four of them ram

lambs. Thus, the new enterprise was up and running with minimal outlay and had good ram lambs to sell."

Ten years later, the Strawbridge family's commercial flock of 260 has been largely replaced by their pedigree Texels. The remaining 100 commercial ewes are half-Texels put back to Texel rams.

Scanned this year, despite endless wet autumn days, at 197% these ewes were winter-clipped at housing; an easy chore for Roger as a former contract shearer.

PROLIFIC

"The half-Texel ewe is hardy and prolific with plenty of milk and makes an excellent and attentive mother. Texel bred lambs certainly tend to stay cleaner than those from some common terminal tups and need less worming."

"In fact, it was working as a youngster with Texels in our commercial flock that led me into pedigree breeding. In the 1980s, Dad was one of the first commercial men hereabouts to use Texels. The change in the quality

was clear Texels were ideal for the modern market."

"20 years later, Texel breeding dominates our local Causeway Coast Lamb Group with 80% of members using Texels to breed better grades for larger cheques with almost all of their lambs killing out at 22kg half weight in E, U and R grades."

Roger lacks the time to exhibit at all the Province's shows, but supports his local events and has enjoyed considerable success. No surprise, given the effort made to breed the very best type of Texel often in co-operation with former employer, Victor Chestnutt, of nearby Bushmills.

Together in 1995, they bought Chessy Batman at the Irish Republic's Maynooth Texel Show and Sale. The following season came Whitehall Commander, a very big sheep placed first in the Royal Ulster Shearling Class at Balmoral the following year.

MALVERN

"Then in 1997, Victor and I bought a true carcase maker, Millend Double Diamond, the Malvern Overall Champion and MLC Class Winner," Roger recalled.

"A grandson of Baltier Aerostar this ram bred lambs with tight skins and added a lot to the Tamnamoney gene pool. In 1999, we purchased Sportman's Frontier at the Lanark Premier Sale for 2,200gns. Sired by the famous Annan Elite, he was the RASE 1999 Second Prize Ram Lamb and is breeding good, strong lambs with excellent gigots and tight skins."

"Our current stock ram, Glenleary Garni, was bought at the Portadown Club Sale for 1,900gns from Coleraine breeder, Sharon Millar. I am very excited about Glenleary Garni and really looking forward to seeing his progeny at grass."

Having invested in top class Texels and bred lambs with size and shape, Roger Strawbridge became a regular vendor at major mainland sales including Lanark.

Last year, for example, Roger and Barbara sold four lambs at Lanark to average £1,470, compared to a 1999 average of £1,498 over three lambs. 

REPORT ON BALLAGLONNEY FLOCK

Texels came and have stayed at Ballaglonney, Crosby, Isle of Man, for strictly commercial reasons as producers of prime lamb to meet the island's highly quality conscious market. The result has been that Ballaglonney breeding has also built up a formidable reputation on the pedigree circuit with a string of major show and sale successes including at the Royal Manx, Royal Highland, Royal, and Royal Welsh Shows.

Ballaglonney is very much a family farming business with father, Colin Creer, son Danny, daughter Kate, and Danny's wife, Paula. The land is spread over three units: Ballaglonney itself which is just 70 acres of low lying ground; Cooilingel, an upland unit of about 300 acres; and West Baldwin, an upland unit but also a good grass farm, again about 300 acres. There are also 100 acres of rented grazings at West Baldwin and the family lease hill grazing for up to 2,000 ewes.

Sheep are about 1,000 Mule and Texel cross commercial breeding ewes put to Texel tups; plus about 180 pedigree Texel ewes and a pure Blackface flock kept on the top ground. Blackface and Swaledale draft ewes are put to Bluefaced Leicester tups for Mule production.

The farms also carry 140 cattle; mostly Limousin and Blonde cross beef suckler cows put to Limousin and Belgian Blue bulls for spring calving with calves sold as stores the following autumn.

"There is a good market on the Isle of Man for a high quality product that

meets the right specification, but we are heavily penalised if we cannot meet these requirements. There is just one abattoir, a modern government owned unit that is run by a farmers' committee. About 60 per cent of meat produced on the island is exported mostly to England and France."

"The pricing structure is heavily quality-orientated with a base price set at R3L, then 20p per kg bonus for E3L/E2 and 10p per kg for U3L/U2. Over fat animals such as O4H are hit by a 35p per kg penalty. The required weight range is 16.5 kg to 19.5 kg carcase weight with a discount of 24p per kg on lambs below 16.5 kg and 10p per kg for lambs over 19.5 kg. In addition there is an additional 8p per kg paid for Farm Assured lambs. These are the prices for February 2001."

"The abattoir sources all its stock direct from farms, the live auction on the island handling just store and breeding stock," he said. "In 1978 I advised a company, Kennaa, on the import of Texels from France resulting

in an initial shipment of 125 ewe lambs and five ram lambs. Of these, five females and one tup came to Ballaglonney," said Colin.

The story is taken up by Danny saying: "We have always kept to the French Texel as we need size and good growth rates to compete with the Suffolk. Simply, our Texels have to match the Suffolk on weight and growth and produce a better lamb for our market."

"Apart from natural service, we have used AI since 1993 which helps to streamline our lambing and to make maximum use of our best genetics. We are looking for size, conformation and leanness but also breed for the tight skins which are favoured by buyers in the pedigree ring."

"Key tups over the years have included Kennaa Hermit, our first tup that was bred by Billard; Freeford Newboy bought in the mid '80s at Chelford; Hull House U Know Who, a big tight skinned ram bought at Lanark in 1992; Wollascott Winning Shot, another big ram that was strong on breed character and which then cost a record 5,600 gns at Lanark, only exceeded in 2000 by a grandson bred by Neil Crichton of the Tweed flock for £7,800 sold at Kelso; and

Baltier Diamond bought in 1997 at the Scottish Premier Sale for 10,000 gns," he said.

Stock tups used include a new addition for 2000, Castlecairn Good Luck, that is strong on breed type and it is hoped will breed well on the Winning Shot daughters; who has once again been used on any unrelated females.

Ballaglonney Texels have taken the coveted Rose Bowl for the supreme sheep at the Royal Manx Show three times. The flock has also provided a string of winners at the Royal Welsh Show and Ballagloney topped the Welsh Premier Texel Sale for five years running from 1994 to 1998, as well as providing the sale champions in 1997 and 1998. Then last year Ballaglonney Dan Dare shown by Stephen Williams topped everything by becoming Texel champion at the three mainland Royal shows, wins that were all the sweeter for Stephen who bred Dan Dare's sire, Wollascott Winning Shot.

Shearling rams and ewes will be sold again during 2001 at Lanark, Builth Wells, Carlisle and Chelford with a further 50 locally on the Island.





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T ip Toe into the 21st Century

Report by Peter Johnson

Kilobytes and megabytes, gopher and binary converter, split cells and hypertext, ribosomes and pleiotropy, recombination and relationship matrix, centromere and mitochondria – the small change of chit-chat from suburbs and markets in the 21st Century. Can you cope?

Most weeks, the posh papers carry news of yet another advance in mapping the human genome. Worldwide, major projects in genome research are also in hand for all major livestock species. Their first fruits are being enjoyed by pig and poultry breeders. Cattle and sheep breeders will benefit from the new technologies within the next few years.

The value of a genome map as far as humans are concerned is that it advances the investigation and possible treatment of a wide range of diseases with a genetic component. In livestock, genome maps should help breed for resistance to some diseases. Markers for economically important traits will accelerate conventional selection programmes and identify genes of possible interest for gene transfer. Some traits are controlled by a single gene and their effect is clearly visible, coat colour or polledness for example.

Most of the commercially important traits, such as growth rate and carcase composition, vary considerably between individuals and are controlled by a number of genes. These variable (or quantitative) genes are located at quantitative trait loci (QTL) on the chromosome.

Genome maps identify the location

of individual genes or other sequences of DNA (molecular markers), genes that are either close together or on the same chromosome. Most markers are signposts, rather than destinations. They are located in the same region of the chromosome as the gene, or genes, of interest.

Any segment of DNA which identifies the variation between animals can be used as a marker. Markers can be used to speed up the introduction of genes from one breed to another, for example the Booroola gene for prolifi-They can also be used to increase selection pressures for traits of economic importance. This is termed marker-assisted gene introgression and it can save two to three generations in the time taken to introduce a desired gene. Conversely, markers can also be used to avoid introducing unfavourable genes.

Marker assisted selection, on the other hand, involves altering the frequency of an existing gene. Selection to increase resistance to scrapie by testing genotypes in the flock is a classic example.

Sire reference schemes are an ideal structure for identifying genetic markers. Very large families are needed to find associations between a genetic marker through analysing DNA from a blood or hair sample, and a production trait.

Marker assisted selection is of most use for traits that are difficult or expensive to measure; for traits that are sex-limited or for traits that are expressed later in life. Examples here are carcase or meat quality traits, dis

ease resistance and reproductive traits.

Because of recombination (see below) the marker and the gene/genes of interest will sometimes become separated from each other from one generation to the next.

To find a marker related to a specific trait, DNA samples are needed from at least two generations, parents and progeny, and performance records are needed from the progeny. Again, a sire reference scheme is an ideal vehicle.

As far as sheep are concerned, the current state of play is as follows: Collaborative research between New Zealand and the United States, with contributions from Australia, France and Germany, has produced a linkage map of 500 markers; some known genes but the majority are identified segments of DNA.

Identifying important regions of the genome, those containing influential QTL, using these markers is well under way through large projects in experimental populations in New Zealand, Australia, the USA, France and Kenya.

The next step is to identify and make use of QTL in commercial populations. This is where the UK steps in with research already under way involving the three major terminal sire reference schemes, Roslin, the SAC, Edinburgh University and the MLC. This three-stage UK initiative involves first comparing the performance of progeny within half-sib families with different marker genes at different places along the chromosome. Second, detailed investigation of the candidate regions and/or genes identified in stage one

and finally, devising strategies to use the results in breeding programmes, the research to be concluded by the autumn of 2003.

Ribosomes are the cell's protein factories. Pleiotropy occurs when a gene affects more than one characteristic, eg., Double muscling in cattle, affecting both muscularity and fertility. Recombination is the crossover of segments of a pair of chromosomes during cell division. Relationship matrix is the expected proportion of genes in common in a group of animals. Centromere is part of a chromosome and mitochondria is a cell's power station.



S ire Reference Scheme

Question marks over premiums, the National scrapie plan, Signet reorganisation, exchange rates, etc., all reinforce the conviction that Easter, rather than mid-winter, would have been a much better bet to survey a new ETS sheep season.

In general, its a promising outlook, with:-

- Increasing demand for performance recorded rams;
- A successful first season using CT, the computer tomograph whole body scanner;
- Genetic resistance to nematodes now moving from the research phase to the field;
- A more flexible Sheepbreeder Mark2 in the pipeline;
- A head-start in selecting for scrapie resistance with three of last season's reference rams genotyped ARR/ARR;
- A decision to increase the group's commitment to marketing;

In July of last year, ETS members sent 353 ram lambs to the CT unit. They were among the most promising lambs from ETS flocks, judged by performance - growth rate and ultrasound scan - and conformation.

Dr Mark Young, the Scientist in charge of the Unit, reported that overall, the Texel consignments were characterised by high muscle to bone ratio and well developed loins and gigots. For the first time he identified lambs with muscle to bone ratios greater than 5.0. Some lambs had remarkable development of muscle in the loin that warrants further investigation.

Results from CT are incorporated into members' performance data to

give a much more accurate picture of carcase composition in the live lamb. EBVs were published for muscle and fat depth measured, as previously, by ultrasound, but also for total weight of lean and total weight of fat.

CT will bring other benefits. For instance, answers to the many questions on relationships between conformation and carcase composition.

Also, convincing proof that the progeny of high index rams can benefit the prime lamb producer and the wholesalers and their multiple retail customers who are increasingly involved in lamb production through allied producer groups. This, and forthcoming results from the high/low trials, will be a valuable weapon in ETS' increasing involvement in marketing.

The high / low trials are a bolt-on to the Crossing Sire Project. This is a Project to develop a selection index for Longwool breeds such as the Bluefaced Leicester, to improve their carcase traits without losing valuable attributes such as prolificacy. It involves nearly 5,000 Mule ewes on farms in England, Scotland and Wales.

In the four-year, bolt-on programme, the Mules are mated with high and low index rams followed by a comprehensive assessment of their prime lamb progeny, both pre-slaughter and post-slaughter.

Following collaborative research involving ETS, Roslin, the Glasgow Vet School and MLC, selection for genetic resistance to nematodes is now moving into the field. The research has identified a high degree of inherited resistance in pedigree flocks.

Sire Reference Scheme

This is not before time. Initial indications from a survey conducted by the Moredun Research Institute show that resistance to white drenches is found in some 60 percent of Scotland's sheep, compared with 24 percent 10 years ago. In the lowlands resistance could be up to 80 percent.

The familiar Sheepbreeder programme, designed for recorded flocks long before the advent of sire reference schemes, has been patched and adapted to cope with the increasing demands of the schemes. Now, MLC has approved the design of a new software programme to be in operation next year. It will involve electronic input and output systems, allow whole-breed blupping of all recorded flocks, provide a flexible means of extracting data and allow for easy inclusion of additional recorded traits, genetic resistance to nematodes for example.

Breed specific indexes will be possible and a much more realistic assessment of the inherent attributes of ram lambs born outside sire reference schemes. This will remove a major cause of friction where, under the present system, bought-in ram lambs, whatever their pedigree, start with a substantial handicap as far as performance is concerned.

If the final version of MAFF's National Scrapie Plan does not deviate markedly from the consultative document, all pedigree breeders will have to seriously consider their options, sooner rather than later. It is clear that 'a voluntary scheme' will be a fairly short-term prelude to a compulsory scheme.

Whatever the final version of the

Scrapie Plan, Texel breeders will have a good deal of work to do to meet MAFF targets, simply because of the genetic make-up of our breed. With a genetically-linked population of some 10,000 ewes, ETS members are well-placed to make progress without jeopardizing selection for other characteristics.

Texel sales are certainly buoyant but history has shown time and again that complacency is the pedigree breeder's besetting sin. Hence a marketing drive. This will target an increasingly receptive audience; the growing number of substantial prime lamb producers who appreciate the need for high performance, in growth rates and lean meat yield. They will be targeted by direct mail, through prime lamb groups and via the World Wide Web, with details of both ETS group activities and progress and the stock available from members' flocks. Although there is no crock of gold in the export business, the possibilities here are also being addressed.

Finally, a public thank you to Richard Oates who has stepped down as Chairman of ETS after nine years at the helm. During this time, the Texel sire reference scheme has grown from 20 members recording 4,000 lambs to 60 members recording more than 6,000 ewes and in excess of 10,000 lambs. His successor is Chris Lewis whose Edingthorpe flock was profiled in the 1999 Journal.

Although it was only founded in 1990 the Loxley Texel flock has already made a big impact on the shows and sales circuit in northern England and beyond.

John North was introduced to the breed in 1984 by his father, also called John, on the family farm at Fenwick

Grange, by the village of Moss, near Doncaster. He was impressed with the high quality commercial traits apparent in the breed's conformation so John decided to invest in a Texel flock of his own and his Loxley flock was first registered in 1990. It is founded on Flashley females, bought from his father, along with a handful of other selective purchases.

The Loxley flock has made immediate impact, with rams selling to 1600gns at the Lanark sale and regular show and sale successes recorded at the Northern Area Club Sale at Skipton. John now runs 50 pedigree breeding females on the 40 acres of grassland he has around Fenwick Grange.

Now the pedigree flock is at its optimum level a small commercial flock is being developed for breeding Eastertype lambs out of season to enter in the winter primestock shows.

This follows John's win at the 1999 National Primestock Show at Birmingham. His two pure-bred Texel

lambs were first in their class on John's only winter primestock show entry so far. The family have also shown commercial lambs only once during the summer show season – they took fl Texel lambs to the Great Yorkshire Show in 1987 and won the supreme championship!

"To compete seriously on the winter primestock circuit you have to lamb ewes in the summer to have them at their peak at the right time of year," John explained. "I purchased a well muscled lamb from John Currie in Northern Ireland which has gone to Texel and Texel cross Roussin ewes to produce lambs for the 2001 shows. I am sure the scale of these ewes combined with the fleshing qualities of this ram will produce the modern type of butchers' lambs which are wanted."

"The Texel is a carcase breed," said John. "It came into this country to do a job - and that was to put carcase quality into the UK flock. The Texel's greatest quality is its meat yielding carcase and that is why it has made

such rapid progress in its growing domination as a terminal sire."

John does strike one note of caution to Texel breeders however. He urges them not to go too far down the road of breeding excessively large-farmed sheep.

"The Texel breed is not supposed to be big. It does not have the limbs or frame to carry a big carcase. Its beauty is its small compact frame which can carry lots of meat and provide good killing out percentages. If the butcher wants bigger sheep the commercial ewe can be used to add scale," he said.

Throughout the planning and development of his Loxley flock John has concentrated on maintaining this fleshing quality and on breeding sheep which are correct and true to breed type.


In 1988 John purchased a ewe lamb at the Skipton sale. She came from the Drake Hill flock and cost 490gns. She has since gone on to make her mark in the breeding lines of the flock.

The Drake Hill ewe was served by Milton of Noth Sir Neil, which was purchased at Chelford, and her first daughter went on to produce an outstanding pair of ewe lambs when served for the first time by Sportsman's Vice Chancellor. These ewe lambs have proved to be the backbone of the flock.


Another ewe, purchased at the Wold Newton dispersal ,produced a ewe and a ram lamb by Vice-Chancellor and it was this ram lamb, Loxley Will Scarlet, which sold at Lanark for 1600gns in 1992.

The buyer of this ram was Geoff Boden who runs the Sportsman's flock and it was he who bred the sire, of which a half share had been purchased at Lanark in 1991. Several other selective female purchases were made over the next few years before John made the decision to breed all his own flock ewes.

Success in the show ring was beginning to become a regular occurrence for the Loxley Texels and John was delighted in 1994 when a ewe lamb he had bred, out of one of the Vice-Chancellor twins, was reserve female at the Lincolnshire County Show and third in a strong entry at the Great Yorkshire. She was sired by Grayrigg Velox, which was an outstanding ram, owned by the late Mike Perrings. The Perrings family also served some of John's ewes with their Noresk Vampire ram and John heaps great praise on Mike and his family for all the help and encouragement they gave him as a new starter in the breed. Brian MacTaggart has also been a source of helpful advice and it was he who

encouraged John to take part in the National Primestock Competition.

As the Loxley flock developed, its quality was recognised by show judges and buyers and homebred females began to make their mark on the circuit. Loxley Alison made her name on the show circuit before selling at Skipton in 1995 for 595gns. She was the first of a line of Loxley gimmers which have become a feature of this Skipton event.

From 1996 till 2000 John has won every reserve supreme championship at the show prior to this sale. However in 1999 he went one step better and won both the championship and the reserve championship awards. His champion was a ram lamb and his reserve was a gimmer both were by his homebred ram, Loxley Cracker.

At the Skipton sale in 1998 five Loxley-bred gimmers sold for a centre record average of 660gns. This included the sale of Loxley Dawn Run, the pre-sale reserve champion and second prize gimmer at the Yorkshire Show. She took the bidding to 1550gns. At the same sale a ewe lamb, Loxley Madame Butterfly, was snapped up at 950gns.

In 1996, 1997 and 1998 John was awarded the small flocks' championship in the Northern Area Texel Club's flock competition. In all those years he also won the Club's show points trophy.

Loxley Cracker was born in 1996 and on his one and only show outing as a lamb he was the first prize ram lamb in a big class at the Great Yorkshire Show. John took him to the Lanark sale with high hopes but he was in the last lot to go into the ring and unfortunately he had to come home again. So John sold a half share to his brother in-law's farming partnership, C and A Jordan, for the Hales flock and used the ram himself.

The following lambing time the disappointment of Lanark turned to relief. John was delighted to have secured the services of this outstanding stock sire for his own flock. Cracker has proved to be a first class sire of both males and females and he had countless breed and interbreed championships as a shearling.

The Great Yorkshire Show has always been one of John's favourite shows and one which he regards as being amongst his greatest challenges. So when he won the Texel supreme breed championship in the Millennium year he was more than delighted. His winning gimmer, Loxley Fancy Pants, is being retained at Fenwick Grange as a new recruit for the pedigree flock.

John is a young breeder with a true enthusiasm for the breed and a desire to be part of its continued success in the 21st century. He was elected to the judging panel in 1998 when he was just 30-years-old and takes a real interest in the development of the breed society. This enthusiasm, together with the quality of his Loxley flock, is sure to secure John a major part in the continued progress of the Texel breed.

The Campbells and Cowal Texels

"I look upon the sheep as a pleasure and relaxation".

Keith Campbell, who holds this seemingly insane view, runs almost a thousand ewes in one of the wildest and most challenging areas of the U.K. - Argyll, in Scotland's wild west. The 3,000 plus Severely Dis-advantaged acres of Drimsynie rise to 2,600 feet above sea level, with the lowest ground nestling at an un-cosy 1,400 feet. The area is "refreshed" with 110 inches of annual rainfall.

This is definitely sheep-only country, and the vast majority of the Drimsynie flock are Scottish Blackfaces. There are however 75 pedigree Texels - the "Cowal" flock, these are the source of the "pleasure and relaxation", so valued by Keith and brother Alan. A third brother - Roy, runs the Lakeland Wool Centre Sheep and Cockermouth in Cumbria. The three brothers trade as K., A. and R. Campbell (the Good, the Bad and the Ugly?).

Gone are the days when a thousand hill ewes could support a couple of families, and farmers have been urged to diversify for decades. The Campbells were some of the first to respond.

In 1968 they provided a caravan park in the nearby village, which was developed as a scout camp, on the condition that they were allowed to manage the caravan park themselves. From that small seed has grown a major tourism enterprise, employing over 180 people, located at Drimsynie and at Dunoon, on the River Clyde, with over 1200 holiday homes; static caravans, chalets and lodges. Of these 230 are owned by the Campbells, the remainder are privately owned, with

the Campbells receiving a ground rent.

With more holiday homes than sheep to care for, it becomes clear as to why the Campbells find their four legged friends more relaxing than the thousands of two legged tourists who holiday in the "Campbell Kingdom".

The location of Drimsynie at the Goil, with head Loch surrounding land reaching dramatically for the clouds, stunning, yet less than 50 miles from the 2.5 million inhabitants of Glasgow (and its airport). Sheep are needed to keep the vegetation on the steep slopes tourist friendly, and sheep in these parts generally means Scottish Blackface.

In September 1984 however Drimsynie welcomed its first Texel. "We had seen them at the Royal Highland where we had been showing Highland ponies", explained Keith, "and we were really impressed with the shape of them, we couldn't get over the backsides on these sheep", he added.

Over the next few years the Campbells bought a few more Texels and chopped and changed the bloodlines, in what they regarded very much as a "hobby" flock. "We had a lot of fun showing them and promoting the breed at the local shows at a time when there were very few pedigree Texels in Argyll", said Keith. "The locals were quietly curious to see just how these meaty sheep would fare in such a demanding environment", he added.

By 1990 the Campbells had realised that the breed was worth taking seriously and pedigree numbers had increased to around 40. Ten years later

they had almost doubled to 75; the current number.

In fact it was on a buying mission to the "Grougfoot" flock of the McKerrow family at Linlithgow, near Edinburgh, that Keith spotted a particularly striking female called Irene. This female, sired by David McKerrow, was eventually secured by Keith and taken back to Drimsynie as Mrs. Keith Campbell.

The purchase of Tinwald Yorkie in 1993 for 17,000 gns, along with Irene McKerrow's brothers, plus Gordon Gray of the "Ettrick" flock at Selkirk and Keith Jamieson of the "Annan" flock in Dumfriesshire was, in Keith's view, a major step forward. "He put some real quality through our females and many of our current flock carry his blood", he said.

Yorkie was followed by North Quarter Deluxe, bought by the same group, minus the McKerrows, for 15,000 gns. This sheep brought "a good skin, strength and character" to the "Cowal" flock.

Cowal Firecracker, which won the MLC ram class at the 1999 Royal Highland carried a blend of Yorkie and Deluxe breeding.

These hefty ram investments are paying off; with Cowal Dynamite selling at Lanark in 1997 to John Morris of Anglesey for 4,000 gns. Two sons of Dynamite have each won a first prize at the last two Royal Welsh Shows.

Ulster breeder Henry Gamble bought Cowal Enterprise the following year for 780 gns. His progeny have also done well in the Province.

The November 1999 sale of shearling ewes at Lanark was topped at 3,000 gns by a Cowal gimmer who had collected a fistful of show rosettes during the summer. She was bought by the Mairs of the "Muiresk" flock in

Aberdeenshire.

The "Cowal" flock currently holds, for the second time, the title for the Best Large and Overall Texel Flock in Scotland.

The Campbells, utilising their tourist facilities, hosted a "Texel Weekend" in November 2000. The highlight of this event was an invitation sale of 18 gimmers. The plan was to send as many people as possible home with a gimmer, (hopefully not the one they came with). The top price of 4,000 gns was hit twice, with the Campbells clocking up a very acceptable 2,800 gns for their offering.

In fact there has been a social Texel Weekend for breed enthusiasts at Drimsynie for the last ten years. All who attend are able to enjoy, amongst other things, curling, bowling, laser shooting, golf and even a little liquid weight lifting!!!

The Texels have not been confined to pedigree breeding at Drimsynie. Sixteen years ago the Campbells experimented with the Texel sire over 20 Blackface ewes. The next year they put 75 Blackies to the Texel. The year after that - half the flock. By the fourth year the entire Blackface flock was mated with Texel tups and nothing has changed since.

Blackie replacements are now bought in from John Wight of Midlock in Lanarkshire. "We want them big, with good skins and legs, the colour of their heads is immaterial", said Keith.

So what was it that persuaded the Campbells to go 100% Texel with their rams? Money of course!

"When we first started using the Texel as a crossing sire we were selling the bulk of our lambs as stores at Dalmally, and the Texel crosses were averaging five pounds a head more than the pure Blackies", explained Keith. "That as much as

anything made the local hill farmers take a second look at the Texel!".

Since then that premium margin has widened to around £7.50 per head.

The Blackies start lambing the third week of April. All cross lambs are sold fat with the first draw being the singles straight off the hill from the end of August/early September through to early November. The remainder are over-wintered off the farm, eventually landing at Roy Campbell's Sheep and Wool Centre in Cumbria. Part of Roy's sheep show is a shearing demonstration, so each Drimsynie hogg gets a minute of stardom before being drafted into batches of 30 or 60 and traded on the electronic auction run by Harrison and Hetherington of Borderway Mart at Carlisle.

"We reckon that on average, 23 out of every 30 of these hoggs earn a grade premium, which considering they are out of Blackface ewes and born and bred in bonny and wild Argyll, says a lot for the Texel influence", said Keith.

A market premium is all very well, but you have to have a live lamb to sell and Blackies had been bred in this wild environment for generations, mainly because of their liveability. The hope of a "softie" Continental enduring the climate and thriving seemed, at the least, optimistic.

"That fear was obviously in our minds the first year the Texel cross lambs were born", said Keith. "But we soon discovered that we didn't need to worry - we couldn't believe how hardy the Texel crosses were. They were treated exactly the same way as the pure Blackies, and we were amazed how well they stood the weather - they're real survivors and we're confident that they are the best shaped sheep we can produce off our

hills", he added. "And what's more - since crossing with the Texel our lambing percentages have increased!".

Until recent times the subsidy system had deterred the Campbells from retaining some of the Texel cross Blackface ewe lambs. The change of subsidy rules has resulted in the Campbells now keeping a few as another "experiment". Watch this space!

The conspicuous increased income the Texel crosses have earned for the Campbells has resulted in them developing a strong local market in Argyll and Dunbartonshire for shearling tups, particularly over the last couple of years. They also sell shearlings at Kelso, Perth and Stirling.

"The future for Texels here is very, very strong", said Keith. "Also, earlier this year I spent a couple of weeks in New Zealand, and the Texel is fitting into the lamb market there really well too. They have adapted the breed to suit their "Easycare" system, where just one man cares for a couple of thousand ewes. With sheep being one of the mainstays of the total New Zealand economy, the Texel is set to have a major impact on the whole country!", he explained.

Back home at Drimsynie, Keith and his brothers accept that the scenery they market so well needs ovine lawn mowers, so they have no choice but to keep sheep. "The Texel breed has given us a totally new dimension to sheep breeding - they've not only put money in our pockets, but also give us a passport to visit and be part of great events like the Royal and Royal Highland Shows. They're a great breed to be involved with - they're great sheep and the people are great company too!".

S AC Research Update



SOME of the commonest questions at Texel breeders' meetings include:-

- Are the relative weightings of live weight, muscle and fat in the lean growth index used by Signet still appropriate for all breeds?
- ♦ Shouldn't conformation be included in this type of index?
- ♦ Is selection on this index leading to crossbred lambs which are more difficult to finish?

As a direct result of these queries, a BBSRC and MLC-funded PhD studentship was set up at SAC to address the first two of these issues.

Huw Jones was appointed to the studentship, and he is about half way through his studies at the moment. He will have results on the relevance of continued selection for lower fatness within the next year and results on conformation, including the role that CT scanning can play in the following six months.

PART OF LARGER PROJECT

The third of the issues mentioned is being addressed as part of an MLC-funded trial which involves mating high and low index Texel, Suffolk and Charollais sires to Mule ewes; this is part of a larger project investigating genetic improvement of crossing breeds, funded by MAFF and MLC, and involving SAC, WIRS and ADAS.

Lambs from the first year's matings are on the ground now (wishing they had webbed feet!), and there will be a further three lamb crops produced to get sufficient numbers of animals to properly answer questions about finishing patterns, and the value of high index terminal sires.

So the final results should be available in about four years' time, but there should be good indications of the final results before then.

HELP FROM ETS MEMBERS

Many Texel breeders will be aware of the fact that Elite Texel Sires members have been helping us for the last three years with MAFF MLC and SERAD-funded research to identify the most cost-effective use of CT scanning in the UK sheep

industry

This has involved scanning about 3,000 lambs in sire referencing schemes (SRS), to get reliable estimates of the association between CT and Signet ultrasound measures.

Although there is still some work to do in this area, it is likely that the best use of CT will be in identifying potential reference sires after an initial screening of animals based on Signet scanning results.

MLC SUPPORTS SRSS TO USE CT

MLC have recently agreed a three year programme of support, to help the major meat breed SRSs use CT to identify rams with high lean growth, and other favourable carcase attributes.

Rams from some of the earlier-lambing breeds have already been scanned at the time of writing, and others are being booked in for this first year of the programme.

The results will have an immediate impact on the accuracy of EBVs and index scores, both for scanned animals and their relatives.

We also hope to have a BSc student working this year on the existing CT data, to validate the use of ultrasonic scanning in identifying high and low lean growth animals in different breeds.

Although we have done some preliminary work on this issue with Dutch Texel breeders, we would like to do more work on exactly how best to define good muscularity, and how to use CT to measure this effectively. We hope to work closely with the Society in the future in seeking resources for this area of work.

GENOTYPING MAY HELP SELECTION

ETS members have also been helping us in a joint Roslin/University of Edinburgh/SAC trial, funded by MAFF and MLC, which is looking for DNA markers of growth and carcase attributes in sheep.

If we do find useful associations between animals' genotypes for one or more marker genes, and their growth and carcass attributes, then genotyping may increase the accuracy of selection for these traits, when it is combined with current performance recording methods.

EASTERN TEXEL BREEDERS

Its 23rd November 2000, its raining (of course) and the deadline for submitting the Club Report is approaching fast. Looking back over the year, the Club's annual gathering at Newmarket for our AGM and Dinner was the most enjoyable for a long time. 




Competition. This, in itself, is a great advert for the Ruthin Club as Geraint has produced a Champion at Ruthin on three occasions.

Northern Ireland Texel Breeders once again enjoyed a better trade than many had feared as British farming slogged through the worst slump since 1939. True, commercial lamb prices were not good but much improved compared to 1999, though the differential between returns for decent grades and the merely mediocre widened. Good news for members of the NI Texel Sheep Breeders' Club as more lamb producers opted to move up to Texel.

Clearly quality pays, in bad times even more than good, so the Texel share of the ram market keeps on growing. Equally encouraging the trend towards using Texel breeding on the female side of commercial flocks continues.

Club officers and members worked hard to achieve this success with two new events organised to help promote the breed.

CARCASE

A very successful Carcase Competition was hosted by the Doherty & Gray processing plant in Ballymena just before the show season started.

Then with North West lamb producers in mind a new annual show and sale was launched at Lisahally on the outskirts of Londonderry. A successful event despite the close proximity of the UK's only land frontier across which rams are available in Irish punts. Currently worth 25% less than our pound sterling!

Even more experienced breeders are shocked when the figures for shearling ram production are highlighted!

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

Ram lambs and shearling rams from Henry Gamble's Springwell flock at Bangor, Co. Down dominated the Society's Northern Ireland Premier Show & Sale at the Automart Livestock Centre, Portadown. And one particular sire left an indelible mark on the proceedings. This was Cowal Enterprise, sire of the top priced ram lamb and the sale leader among the shearling rams.


Enterprise's progeny at the sale earned more than £10,000 with a substantial contribution made by the much admired 2,000gn ram lamb, bought by Malcolm Reid for his Meadowvale flock at Ballygawley.

The eight Enterprise-sired ram lambs offered averaged £803 and five shearlings £920.

A lamb by Vern Fisherman from John Foster's Springhill flock attracted a lot of attention eventually changing hands at 1,600gs and a well-muscled lamb from John Currie & Sons, sired by Glenside Four Square and out of a dam by Pennine A-One, went to Nigel Hamill at 1,500gs.

A similar sum was secured by John Garrivan for a son of Clougher Elvis and at 1,400gs a consortium of four breeders bought a son of Easterseat Fugitive from Robbie and Kim Mulligan.

Although no records were broken, as in 1999, bidding was brisk throughout the sale. A total of 190 ram lambs changed hands to average £306, com-

pared with £321 for 225 the previous year. A bigger entry of shearling rams averaged £327 for 159 against £333 for 134 and there was a particularly brisk demand for females with 105 returning £237 apiece compared with £196 for 74 in 1999.

Leading the way in the female section was a gimmer by Annan Daktari from Michael and James Watson. She had enjoyed a successful summer show season, stood reserve supreme at Portadown and made 1,600gs to join Robert Robinson's Cloughbane flock at Dunngannon.

Mr Robinson also paid 1,100gs for a gimmer from Henry Gamble, again by Cowal Enterprise.

The show and sale champion was a gimmer by Bishopton Diamond from Sam and Robin Chesney's Balligan flock at Kircubbin, County Down. She made 750gs.

Auctioneers were Automart Livestock Sales.





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Scottish National Show & Sale 2000

With the breed on an all-time high, a fast and furious trade at Lanark looked a foregone conclusion. There were pre-sale doubts however, not least because of the general malaise in all sectors of the industry with little light at the end of the tunnel..

In the event, the optimists were right. A record number of ram lambs changed hands, the average of £918.87 for 443 was up £141.62 on 1999, there was a ceiling bid of 21,000gs and a further four four-figure prices.

Of most encouragement, the excellent trade was not confined to top breeders' flocks.

Forecast changes to the hill subsidy system and an increasing number of lowland flockmasters seeking an infusion of Texel blood in the prime lamb dam meant a firm base to prices throughout the sale.

Summing it up, Chief Executive Steven McLean said, "Texel cross lambs in the south, sold through the live market and through Farmers Fresh attract between £3 and £7 per head premium as long as they have the necessary conformation and fat cover."

"Texel cross ewes are also attracting substantial premiums compared with other breeds and crosses."

Yet again, the dominance of the Glenside flock at Lanark and beyond was underlined with the 21,000gn top price of the day and a tremendous average of nearly £5,000 for seven lambs.

John Forsyth's sale leader looked the part in the catalogue and certainly drew the eye on the day. This was Glenside Gurka by Muiresk Forever and out of a dam by the 33,000gn Muiresk Blondin.

Muiresk Forever, in the joint ownership of the Mairs and Willie Knox, was the first prize shearling ram and reserve male champion at the 2000 Royal Highland.

Gurka eventually went to a syndicate of the Mair and Knox families and Mrs Margaret Lyon.

Gurka was the first of the Glenside pen into the ring. Next came Glenside Great Scot, again out of a dam by Blondin but by Glenside Footprint, a son of Culterallers Exocet and running in the Glenside flock..

Buyers were Mr & Mrs D. Lewis, Cwmnanteinon, Rhos, Carmarthenshire, the Nanteinon flock, one of a number of flockmasters from Wales who stamped their mark on the sale.

The last of the Glenside pen, again out of a dam by Blondin, this time by Turin Fantastic, made 3,000gs to the Jones family, also from the Principality, for their Coedmore Hall flock near Lampeter, Ceredigion.

The Lewis's came again for the Knox's Haddo Gonzales, first prize ram lamb at Turriff Show. They paid 4,200gs for this son of the 9,000gn Glenside Forsyth out of a dam by Glenside Drum Major.

Gordon Gray had a flier with eight Ettrick lambs averaging £3,891.56. Six of the pen were by the 4,200gn Knock Firefly, two by Annan Braveheart. The first lamb into the ring, by Firefly, showed the shape of things to come. The opening bid was

1,000gs, the closing bid 3,800gs and the lamb went to Baltier.

At 5,800gs Ettrick Glenbreck, the second prize lamb at Biggar Show, by Firefly and out of a dam by Tinwald Yorkie, joined David Houghton's Tophill flock. Then came the most keenly contested lamb, Ettrick Glenmorangie. By Firefly, out of a dam by Milnbank Yesterday and from the same family as the 11,000gn Ettrick Drambuie, Glenmorangie had been placed fifth in the ram lamb class at the Highland.

After a fierce battle, the victor at 16,000gs was a consortium of the Jamiesons (Annan), the Cullens (Craighead), Caroline Hastings (Courthill) and the Campbell brothers (Cowal).

Glenside was again in the picture with the third highest price of the day, 12,000gs paid by John Mackie (Milton of Noth) and Gordon Wilson (Glenisla) for Brian Buchan's Clinterty Geronimo, a son of Glenside Eurostar and out of a Watchknowe-bred ewe. The breeder retained a share.

At 10,000gs Keith Jamieson's Lanark supreme champion and first - prize ram lamb in the MLC class was bought by Cumbrian breeders Bob Sutton (Crosscrake) and Peter Woof (Stainton). The lamb, Annan Goldsmith, is by Annan Born Free and out of a maternal sister to Annan Dazzle.

The fifth five-figure bid, 11,000gs, came for one of an eye-catching pen from Bruce and Kenny Mair's Muiresk flock. This was Muiresk Grand Slam, first prize ram lamb at the Highland

and a son of the 5,500gn Turin Fantastic, bought in 1999 by the Mairs in partnership with Glenside and Baltier. Buyers were Albert and George Howie.

The eight Muiresk lambs averaged £3,661.88.

Two lambs made 9,000gns apiece. The Howies recouped some of their outlay on Grand Slam when they received 9,000gs for Knock Gizmo, a son of the 16,000gn Glenside Eurostar, sire of Knock Firefly, and out of a ewe by Haddo Bertie. Buyers were Andy Frazier, the Menithwood flock and Mrs Avril Evans (Raglan).

Jim Neil's Neills Gucci by Stonebridge Fantastic changed hands at a similar figure, joining the Auchans, Watchknowe and North Quarter flocks.

At 8,000gs Angus McColm's Crailloch Goldeneye, a son of Ettrick Emperor., went in a joint purchase to the Lairds, (Cambwell) and the Clarks, (Garngour.)

Demand for shearling rams mirrored that for lambs with an increase in the average of £46, to £447, with 18 more sold.

At the top of the shearling price list was Robin and Nancy Orr's Halbeath FBI, by the 5,500gn Haddo Equal and out of a ewe by Ettrick Action Man. The Halbeath shearling ,with a successful summer show season behind him, joined Bob Johnstone's Crawfordjohn flock.

At 1,700gs Bob and Anne Payne bought Doug Nesbitt's Alwent Famous, second in his class at the Royal as a

ram lamb and male champion at the Northumberland Show as a shearling.

Alwent's shearlings led the averages here with four at £816.38. Two other four-figure bids came sons of Forgue Edward. At 1,400gs, a shearling from Jim and Helen Clark joined Jim Black's Corrie flock and at 1,100gs the Laird's Cambwell Fusileir went to the University of Wales.

Even without the help of a spectacular sale, as in 1999 when a Blondin daughter changed hands at 7,500gs, the average for shearling ewes rose from £275 for 160 to £327 for 151.

However, as in '99, John Forsyth

again paraded the sale leader, a gimmer by the 7,500gs Culterallers Exocet, that changed hands at 2,800gs to Mrs Margaret Lyon, Milnbank. Mr Forsyth's pen of four averaged £1,391.25.

Another Glenside gimmer, again by Exocet, made 1,200gs and another four, including the female champion from Alan Cochrane, made four-figure prices.

The bouyant demand for all classes of breeding sheep was not confined to Lanark. At the Society's English National Show & Sale at Worcester, averages were well up for ram lambs, shearling rams and shearling ewes in a steady rather than spectacular trade.

The 86 ram lambs averaged £499.80 compared with £461.88 for nine more the year before. Shearling rams averaged £391.65 for 97 against £316.91 in '99 and the 50 shearling ewes £247.80 (£181.53).

Yet again, the Forsyth family had a great day. John Forsyth's Glenside Go-Getter was the top price ram lamb at 3,000gs. Robert Forsyth's Baltier Graduate took the breed championship.

The 3,000gn lamb was similarly bred to Mr Forsyth's 21,000gn lamb at Lanark with a common sire, the 8,000gn Muiresk Forever, shared with the Mairs and Willie Knox, and out of a ewe by Muiresk Blondin.

The buyer was Steve Smith for his Penparc flock.

Show champion Baltier Graduate, by Baltier Frisky and out of a dam by Annan Acrobat, changed hands at 1,500gs to join W.H.Sinnett & Son's Stockton flock but a lamb by Turin Fantastic made the highest price in the Baltier pen, 2,000gs to join James and Hannah Draper's Claybury flock.

The Mairs enjoyed another excellent sale making the second highest price, 2,500gs for Muiresk Great Expectations. This son of Glenside Forsyth joined G.J.& J.E.Williams Padest flock at Cray, Brecon.

Another Muiresk lamb, Gulliver by

Glenside Drum Major, took the reserve male championship, made 2,200gs and returned to Scotland in the joint ownership of the Grougfoot, Cowal and Turin flocks.

A.E.Williams & Son's Clun flock were in the money, starting with a four-figure ram lamb by Ballaglonney Enamour and following that with the highest price of the day, 3,200gs for a shearling son of Clun Dominator that joined R.&B.Smith's Slapton flock.

The next Clun shearling into the ring, again by Dominator, changed hands at 1,200gs and F.H.Chave & Son provided the third four-figure shearling in a son of Turin Earnest that made 1,500gs.

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
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


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• WELSH NATIONAL SHOW SALE 2000

In common with the other majors, averages at the Welsh National Show & Sale at Builth Wells were well up without the help of spectacular individual prices. The ceiling bid, for a shearling ram , was 2,800gs but the average with six more sold rose by £61.60 to £547.70 .

The 96 ram lambs, an increase of a dozen more sold, levelled at £340.16, again a healthy improvement on '99 to the tune of £65.53.

The 52 shearling ewes averaged £262.50, up just over £90.

The 2,800gn shearling came from Messrs G.Williams & Sons' Caron flock based at Penuwch, Tregaron. Named Caron Fella, he was by Clougher Envy, reserve male champion at the Royal Welsh in '99, and out of a dam by Cowal Waffler. Buyers were C.S Watkins & Son, the Pantglas flock.

Four other shearlings changed hands for four-figure bids, two of them from S.P. & C.P.Williams' Wollascott flock and both by the champion of champions, Ballaglonney Dan Dare.

Wollascott Father Ted , a triplet, made 2,100gs to Mr C.E.Pryce, the Caereinion flock, and the twin-born Front Man, 1,700gs to R.S.T.Morgan, Whitchurch.

Ballaglonney Ltd.'s powerful pen included Ballaglonney Fielder, by Tinwald A-One and out of a dam by Wollascott Winning Shot, sire of Dan Dare. He changed hands at 1,700gs to Marshall Farms and joined the Chargot flock at Luxborough, Somerset.

Almost inevitably, there was a strong Glenside flavour to the two highest priced ram lambs. At the head

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
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


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
